Subject: Cross Border Ambulance Queries

Thank you for your request for information received on 28th August which was dealt with under the terms of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Northern Ireland Ambulance Service (NIAS) Health and Social Care Trust has now completed its search for the information you requested and that is detailed below.

1) What barriers (if any) are in place at present that prevents this crossborder emergency NIAS ambulance conveyance from occurring in all emergency situations? Mutual recognition of the professional registration of clinicians (e.g. doctors / paramedics) no longer exists between the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. This means that clinicians from Northern Ireland cannot legally practice in the Republic and vice versa, unless they hold dual registration.

2) What exceptions are presently made to enable crossborder emergency NIAS ambulance conveyance? NIAS holds Memoranda of Understanding with the National Ambulance Service of Ireland to cover cross-border response in the event of an acute emergency and the provision of mutual aid in the event of a declared major incident. Due to mobile phone roaming arrangements in proximity to the border, it is not uncommon for NIAS to receive emergency calls from the Republic and vice versa. The receiving organisation will normally undertake triage of the emergency call and then pass details electronically to their counterpart in whose jurisdiction the emergency has arisen. In border areas both services may provide an emergency response to the opposite jurisdiction, but the patient is typically transferred to a hospital within the health service of the country where the incident occurred.





3)	Can you please provide any reviews/reports/etc relating to the conveyance of patients by emergency NIAS ambulance across the border that have been published since 1st January 2020.	NIAS has not published any such reports.
4)		Both NIAS and the National Ambulance Service of Ireland have made representation to their respective Departments of Health and professional bodies highlighting the issue of cross-border working, and NIAS is currently meeting with representatives from the Department of Health to seek long-term practical solutions.
5)	Can you confirm any meetings/seminars/conferences et cetera that have taken place that included discussion of cross border emergency ambulance conveyance of patients - since 1st January 2020	Meetings and discussions have been held between the senior management teams of both Ambulance Services and their respective Departments of Health, and the Medical Directors and Chief Executives of both services have held joint discussions on how to progress the issue. The NIAS Emergency Planning team, Helicopter Emergency Medical Service team, and the Trauma Network leads have held discussions with their counterparts to scope how cross-border emergency response might be facilitated in future. An all-island trauma care conference was held in Belfast in September 2024 where areas of mutual interest and potential support were discussed. Outside of NIAS, we are aware that the Western Trust has previously held meetings for many years with their counterparts in the Republic of Ireland regarding the cross-border transfer of patients for the purpose of primary percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI).

I hope the above fully assists you.

If you are dissatisfied in any way with the handling of your request, you have the right to request a review. You should do this as soon as possible, or in any case within two months of the date of issue of this letter.
